

PAYMENT FOR SEXUAL ASSAULT EXAMINATIONS CAN INCLUDE:

EXAMINER FEE \$400 IF PERFORMED BY A QUALIFIED PROVIDER

- History and documentation
- Physical examination
- Collection of specimens
- Follow up tests and treatment for the prevention of STIs

FACILITY FEES UP TO \$300

- The examination room
- Medical supplies
- Medical equipment use, such as colposcope and camera

REASONABLE LABORATORY FEES PAID AT 75%

- Collection of laboratory specimens
- STI testing, including HIV and hepatitis screening
- Pregnancy testing
- Drug and alcohol screens

REASONABLE PHARMACY FEES PAID AT 75%

- Prescriptions to prevent STIs and pregnancy

RETURN VISIT FEES

- Testing and prescriptions for the prevention of STIs
- Qualified Provider fee of \$200 for follow-up care
- Facility fee has the same payment limits as the initial examination of \$300

Crime Victim Compensation

The Sexual Assault Examination Program pays only the costs associated with a forensic examination for a sexual assault crime. Victims often have additional physical or emotional injuries, separate from those addressed by the sexual assault evidence exam that may be covered under the Crime Victim Compensation Program.

All sexual assault victims should be given an application for the Crime Victim Compensation Program.

The Crime Victim Compensation Program may help pay other crime-related costs of the victim such as counseling costs, lost wages, additional medical costs, crime scene cleanup, and clothing replacement.

Funding for the Sexual Assault Examination Program and Crime Victim Compensation Program comes entirely from state and federal criminal fines and penalties. No tax dollars are used.

History & Authority

The Sexual Abuse Examination Payment Program was established in 1979 to pay the cost of evidentiary examinations for victims of sexual crimes. The Iowa Attorney General's Victim Assistance Section has administered the program since July 1, 1990.

The State's authority and responsibility to pay for the examinations is established in Iowa Code section 915.41:

The cost of a medical examination for the purpose of gathering evidence and the cost of treatment for the purpose of preventing venereal disease shall be paid from the fund [The Compensation Fund] established in section 915.94.

Program Purpose

The Sexual Assault Examination Program has a three-fold purpose. Victim Assistance Section pays the cost of forensic examinations to ensure that evidence is collected in a proper and timely manner. Victim Assistance Section pays the cost of the medical examination to assure the wellbeing of victims of sexual abuse. Finally, Victim Assistance Section pays the cost of treatment for the prevention* of a sexually transmitted infection (STI) for a victim.

*If a STI is contracted, the charges for the treatment of the contracted STI could potentially be paid by the Crime Victim Compensation Program.

The Sexual Assault Examination Program pays the cost of an evidentiary sexual abuse examination whether or not the victim reports the crime to law enforcement. A timely exam ensures that evidence is properly collected and maintained if the victim later decides to report the crime. Sexual assault evidence is most effectively collected from adults in the 120 hours immediately following the assault. For children, the effective collection period is slightly shorter, but best done as soon as possible.

The Sexual Assault Examination Program has no direct contact with the sexual abuse victim.

There is no application for the Sexual Assault Examination Program.

Medical providers and laboratories must send bills directly to the Sexual Assault Examination Program.

Per federal regulations, medical providers cannot refuse to provide an exam because the victim chooses not to report to law enforcement.

Sexual Assault Exam Billing Guidelines

The Sexual Assault Examination Program has the following billing guidelines by law and administrative rule.

- The program is the primary payer for sexual abuse medical and evidentiary exams.
- A provider is **prohibited** from billing the victim for the forensic and medical examination, including any balance remaining after the Sexual Assault Examination Program has paid.
- It is **unlawful** for a provider to bill any cost of the exam to a victim's private or public health insurance provider.



Sexual Assault Examination Billing Procedures

- Bills for a sexual assault examination are submitted to the program directly by the examiner, facility, laboratory, or pharmacy.
- The bill must itemize each cost and include the name of each service provided.
- The diagnosis must be properly coded for sexual abuse, generally T74.21XA, T74.22XA.
- The bill must include the Federal identification Number of the provider, the date of service, and the victim's name and date of birth.
