# Courses

## Victim Assistance 101:

This training will provide attendees with important information about the different programs that are available to survivors of crimes and their families through the Victim Assistance Section. 1 hour

## Legal Updates:

Laws change fast and frequently, stay up to date on the newest laws as they relate to sexual abuse, human trafficking and elder abuse. 1 hour

## Vicarious Trauma for First Responders:

During this training, attendees will learn how working with traumatized individuals will affect providers/responders over time. The training will suggest ways to release that trauma, so it doesn't cause issues for the responder in the future. 1 hour (Wellness CLE 1 hour approved)

## Ethics of Chapter 915:

Prosecutor's ethical duties as required under Chapter 915 of the Iowa Code - Victims' Rights. 0.5 hour (Ethics CLE 0.5 hour approved)

## Compensation Program:

A more in-depth look at the Iowa Crime Victim Compensation Program. Training will discuss the eligibility requirements and the benefits available for victims and potentially their family. An ideal for advocates, law enforcement, prosecutors, medical and mental health professionals. 30 minutes

## Sexual Assault Examination (SAE) Program:

During this training medical facilities and providers will learn the appropriate documentation needed for our Crime Victim Section to provide payment to nurses or facilities that provide sexual assault services to survivors. 30 minutes

## Statewide Victim Service Call Center:

Attendees will learn how the Iowa Victim Service Call Center operates and provides services to survivors within Iowa. 1 hour

### **Trauma:**

Attendees will learn how the trauma will affect the survivor and their memory.  
1 hour

### **Testifying and Trial Prep:**

This training will provide information to all that may become witnesses for the case and those that will be testifying during trial. Attendees will learn appropriate demeanor, how to answer questions, and ways to prepare for trial. (still being prepared) 2 hours

### **Rape Culture:**

During this training you will learn where we developed our bias when it comes to sexual abuse and how the media has influenced most people's judgement when it comes to sexual abuse. We will also discuss one of the newest forms of sexual abuse, revenge porn. 1 hour

### **Consent Issues:**

This training provides attendees with information on how consent may direct the investigation and how to help investigate cases where the offender claims consent and the survivor says it wasn't consensual. 1 hour

### **Sexual Abuse Report Writing:**

This training will provide attendees with best practices for writing reports for sexual abuse investigations to include using quotes from both the survivor and the suspect, importance of using appropriate wording and more. 1 hour

### **Starting and Maintaining a Sexual Assault Response Team (SART):**

This training will discuss how to start and maintain a SART. SARTs have been proven to result in the best outcomes in sexual abuse cases. 1 hour

### **Track Kit:**

During this training, attendees will learn how to enter kits into the Track Kit system and why it is important to be transparent to the survivors of sexual abuse. 45 minutes

### **Overview of a Sexual Assault Examination:**

This training will discuss what a survivor will experience during a sexual assault exam and how the evidence collected can be utilized by law enforcement and prosecution. 2 hours

### **Sexual Assault Prosecutions:**

Learn the best practices for sexual assault investigations and prosecutions including interviewing and corroboration. 2 hours

### **Child Sex Abuse Prosecutions:**

Learn the dynamics involved in child sexual abuse, how to recognize grooming that has played a role in the offense, the evidence to look for and collect to corroborate the disclosure and create the best case for prosecution. 2 hours

### **Alcohol/Drug Facilitated Sexual Abuse:**

This training will provide attendees with knowledge on how alcohol and drugs can be used to facilitate sexual abuse, common trends, and ideas to use during the investigation to determine if alcohol or drugs were used as a weapon against the survivor. 1 hour

### **Domestic Violence Prosecutions:**

Learn the best practices for domestic violence investigations and prosecutions, including trials without a victim. 3 hours

### **Starting and Maintaining a Domestic Assault Response Team (DART):**

This training will discuss how to start and maintain a DART. DARTs have been proven result in the best outcomes in domestic abuse cases. 1 hour

### **Homicide and Other Violent Crime Prosecutions:**

Learn the best practices for working with victims and survivors of homicide and other violent crimes throughout the entirety of the legal process. 1 hour

### **Human Trafficking in Iowa:**

During this training attendees will learn about trends in trafficking in Iowa and what we can do to provide the survivors with the best care. 2 hours

### **Victims in the Parole Process**

This training will give an overview of the Parole Process and Victim's Rights within that process including registration, notification, and attendance at parole hearings. 1 hour

### **Victim Advocacy v. Victim Witness Coordination**

This training will focus on each position's roles to include how they are alike and how they differ. It will also speak to how important it is for the positions to work together as a team and the benefits of both. 1 hour

Stay up to date to better understand new trends, case law, and statutory changes affecting traffic stops and OWIs. The training can be customized to fit your needs. Let us know the topics you would like included and how long you would like the training to last (trainings can go from 1 to 4 hours depending on your request and topics you want covered). Topics can include, but are not limited to: traffic stops (whether a seizure occurred, pretextual stops; reasonable suspicion; probable cause; extending a traffic stop, mistake of law or fact, and canines); automobile searches; searching motor vehicle passengers; search incident to arrest; inventory searches, constructive possession, operation, SFSTs, PBTs, implied consent, chemical test choice; 804.20; independent tests; Iowa's two 2-hour rules; impaired driving; search warrants for blood draws; warrantless blood draws; chemical test refusals; vehicular homicide; operating without owner's consent; witness testimony; report writing; speedy indictment; and Cedar Rapids v. Atsinger.
